Arts & Humanities English and American Studies/Civics Integrated Course II

10th grade Theme: This course will focus on the question "What is right?" During this time period, students will examine the history of America civilization and literature from Industrial Revolution to the Great Depression. They will reflect on the groups of people and individual people and the decisions they made. Students will also determine if the decisions made were right at time period or wrong. Is right always right? Or are there circumstances that will allow it to be right. When it is right and when it is wrong for certain actions.

American Studies II course will cover American History from the Industrial Revolution to the Great Depression information on the content material will be provided. In the A & H American Studies II course, content material is taught through utilizing the Arts and Humanities perspectives.

Note: Honors course will require more independent reading and writing assignments. The expectations for students in the Honor section is engagement in more critical analysis of content material.

WRITING ASSESSMENTS (20%)

• Essays & Papers: Each essay is up to the student to complete individually. There will be essays for this course. There will be Free Response Questions (FRQs) and Document Based Questions (DBQs). The process for completing these essays will be provided. Sources must be cited (MLA format) while writing the essay/paper. The essays assigned are up to the student to complete individually on the date that the essay is due. However, there will be written essays that must be completed within the class period. However, students may use notes to complete their essays. Note: Points will be deducted from late essays/papers. (5 points for each day it is late)

MIDTERM/FINAL EXAMS (25%)

- Written Assessment: Multiple-choice, Matching, True/False etc.
- **Document Based Questions:** A packet consisting of at least 10 primary sources which requires short answer responses
- Essay: Persuasive or informative essay
- Projects: Projects will be completed individually or in groups. For projects/presentations students who will present will be chosen at random. There will be a limit to the number of words permitted on each slide. Note: Points will be deducted from late projects/presentations. (5 points for each day it is late)
- **Presentations:** Students who will present will be chosen at random. Directions for the oral and visual presentation will be given. There will be a limit to the number of words permitted on each slide. **Note:** *Points will be deducted from late projects/presentations.* (5 points for each day it is late)
