Basketball and Cheer are done within each middle school.

Therefore, the castle has their own team and practices will be at our school. Other sports are a collection of players from all the schools. Volleyball, football, soccer, cross country, and field hockey are played at the Hazleton High School facilities, usually on the main campus (near the high school) or football stadium, Harman-Geist Memorial Field. The fall sports season traditionally lasts from late August until early October.

Another concern addressed in the survey was being able to play in 8th or 9th grade if they did not play the year before. The answer is absolutely. You can start a new sport at any time. Just get that physical and try it out!

Transportation seemed to be another concern for many students. Unfortunately, the district does not meet all transportation needs. There is a sports bus that will take students to the sports facilities if their practice is immediately after school. This is extremely helpful, but you will then need to find your own transportation home after the practice.

Can boys play volleyball? Yes,

middle school soccer, volleyball, and cross country are for both girls and boys. That means that both can try out for those fall sports. This past fall, the castle had 13 middle school students playing in a fall sport for the Hazleton Cougars. Nathan Caba, Gavin Deritis, and Carlos Alcantara make many tackles with the football team. Estrella Taveras and Briana Colon dig, set, and spike with the volleyball team. Jioshaylee Vasquez and Jacelyn Pena used their hockey sticks to score on the field hockey. Joanna Estudillo, Kevin Estudillo, Maikel Juarez, and Sheyneliz Pineda head, dribble (with their feet), and kick the ball to score on the soccer field. Jiliana Melo and Axel Nunez showed their endurance by running with the cross-country team.

Most of these 13 students said they had fun, and they will be joining their team again next year. Try it out, if you are as eager! Reminder, if you are interested in joining them next year, listen to the announcements in the spring (usually in May) for information regarding physicals and signing up. It is then tradition that the championship team plays the teachers. But first, the students of the castle




