Daveiel Tejeda is scared of switching classes and detention.


All in all, most sixth graders are afraid of middle school teachers. Good luck to all sixth graders next year!

Bryan Gonzalez, seventh grade, said, "I'm going to Washington, D.C. to go to Great Waves and visit my uncle."


Jose Eyevas, HMS student, said, "I am going to New York. Then going fishing and to Splish Splash (water park)."

A FREE SPORTS CLINIC will be held at HAHS on Saturday, May 31st. Forms for the clinic are available in the nurse's office.

Physicals at PRIVATE DOCTORS must be done AFTER June 1st to count towards the 2014-15 school year. It is recommended students attend the sports clinic, or schedule an appointment with their doctor for the first week of June. 
