What is PJAS?

PJAS stands for the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science. This club is run by Mrs. Planutis.

If you are interested in science, then this is the club for you. Students in this club get to work on all kinds of interesting science projects and experiments in Biochemistry, Behavioral Science, Biology, Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Earth and Space Science, Ecology, Mathematics, Microbiology, Physics, or Zoology.

First you must come up with a topic. After you determine what experiment to do, Mrs. Planutis will approve it. After you receive your approval, you are free to begin researching your topic.

Eventually you will design and conduct your experiment. You will

analyze your results and then begin putting a speech and presentation on to the state competition, also together to present your experiment



in competition at King's College in Wilkes Barre, PA.

At districts, you will compete against other students from different surrounding schools who have similar experiments.

If you win, you will get to move known as "States."

States is held at Penn State University in University Park Pennsylvania. All district winners from the entire state of Pennsylvania attend the event.

This trip is usually held over a three day period in May. Students get their own room and free food for the whole weekend. It is a lot of fun, but remember you are there for a reason, to compete against the best student scientists in the whole state of Pennsylvania.

If you win States, it is a great honor. You receive either a scholarship, savings bond or cash award.

PJAS is a lot of fun if you like science. If you aren't sure if PJAS is for you, come to a meeting.
