Ms. Rimshaw (Middle School Third Place): My homeroom was the inspiration. They came up with the design.



8th Graders Build an Interactive Diorama

8th Grade Students Mason Tobias , Albalina Fernandez, Jatna
Abreu, and Eliesel Lazala Gomez created an interactive diorama of the Apollo
11. This was the spacecraft that first landed humans on the moon. The students built the diorama out of cardboard and a hummingbird robotics
kit. Hummingbird kits are creative robotics tools which allows students to design, build, and program a personally meaningful robot out of any materials, with any device, in multiple programming languages. Students coded over 35 lines of code to make their rocket rise and lower into orbit of their project. The robotics parts were gifted to the school from the PPL Foundation's Empowering Educators grant in their 8th grade Computer Science class.

...Every year, thousands of letters are sent to "Juliet" in Verona, Italy, home of the well-known tale "Romeo and Juliet". A group of volunteers answer the letters and award a prize to the most moving love letter.

... Cupid, the baby with wings and a bow and arrow, has been linked to Valentine's Day for centuries. Cupid was known to the ancient Greeks as Eros, the god of love and was the son of the Greek goddess, Aphrodite.

During the Middle Ages, men would pull out the names of women who they would be paired with during a Roman festival.
